Minnesota State Grant End-of-Year Statistics Fiscal Year 2023

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About the Office of Higher Education

The Minnesota Office of Higher Education is a cabinet-level state agency providing students with financial aid programs and information to help them gain access to postsecondary education. The agency also serves as the state's clearinghouse for data, research and analysis on postsecondary enrollment, financial aid, finance and trends.

The Minnesota State Grant Program is the largest financial aid program administered by the Office of Higher Education, awarding up to \$235 million in need-based grants to Minnesota residents attending eligible colleges, universities and career schools in Minnesota. The agency oversees other state scholarship programs, tuition reciprocity programs, a student loan program, Minnesota's 529 College Savings Plan, licensing and early college awareness programs for youth.

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
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Executive Summary

The Minnesota State Grant program is a need-based financial aid program established in 1969 to assist Minnesota resident undergraduates attending public and private postsecondary institutions in Minnesota. The State Grant program is designed to provide choice and access for undergraduate students to attend the postsecondary institutions that best meet their needs. In fiscal year 2023, approximately 67,854 students received State Grants, for a total of nearly \$215 million.

The State Grant program provides financial aid to students in conjunction with the Federal Pell Grant. In 2023, students from families earning less than \$10,000 annually received the highest combined average award (\$7,190).

Report Highlights:

- In fiscal year 2023, 54% of State Grant recipients had a family adjusted gross income of less than \$40,000.
- Most State Grant recipients attended a public university: 59% of recipients attended a Minnesota State College or University, 17% attended the University of Minnesota, and 24% attended a private college.
- In academic year 2021-2022, Minnesota ranked 17th in financial aid spending per full-time equivalent undergraduate among all states and U.S. territories¹, according to the National Association of State Student Grant Aid Programs Annual Survey.

¹ Full-time equivalent undergraduates are calculated by taking the sum of credits carried by all undergraduate students enrolled in classes, divided by the number of credits in a full-time load (15 credits). An FTE of 1.0 is equivalent to one full-time student.

Introduction

Established in 1969, the Minnesota State Grant program is a need-based financial aid program created to assist Minnesota resident undergraduates attending public and private postsecondary institutions² in the state. The State Grant program is designed to provide choice and access to undergraduate students to attend the postsecondary institutions that best meet their needs. The State Grant program provides financial aid to students in conjunction with the federal Pell Grant. In fiscal year 2023, approximately 67,584 students were awarded grants, totaling nearly \$215 million.

The goal of the program is established in Minnesota Statute 136A.095 (https://www.revisor.mn.gov/statutes/cite/136A.095):

The legislature finds and declares that the identification of men and women of the state who are economically disadvantaged and the encouragement of their educational development in eligible institutions of their choosing are in the best interests of the state and of the students.

Since 1983, Minnesota State Grant policy has used the Design for Shared Responsibility model, a framework that was influenced by the work of the Carnegie Commission on Policy Studies in Higher Education. The Design for Shared Responsibility model accounts for the student's family income, choice of institution, enrollment level, and distributes the price of postsecondary education among students, families, and taxpayers. This policy statement provides a framework when considering changes to the State Grant program.

This report contains data on the number and dollar amounts of Minnesota State Grants received by Minnesota-resident undergraduate students for fiscal year 2023 (July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023). Because a student's State Grant award considers a federal Pell Grant award the student receives, this report includes tables and graphs of combined Federal Pell and Minnesota State Grant awards received by Minnesota State Grant recipients. The report also includes data on student characteristics that impact the calculation of State Grant awards: family adjusted gross income³, dependency status/family circumstances, institution choice, and registration credit load. State Grant award recipient demographics such as race, ethnicity and gender are also reported. All tables and charts in this report show the family adjusted gross income of Minnesota State Grant recipients as reported on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) from the parents' federal income tax return. For dependent students, the parents' adjusted gross income is used, whereas for independent students, the student's (and spouse's, if married) adjusted gross income is used.

Information reported in this report is based on State Grant data available as of January 5, 2024, and totals may differ from other documents published by the Minnesota Office of Higher Education before or after this date.

² Private postsecondary institutions that meet eligibility requirements are able to participate in the State Grant program if they choose to

³ Adjusted gross income is gross income minus certain deductions, such as health savings account deductions or retirement account contributions. Adjusted gross income is used to calculate federal taxable income.

Fiscal Year 2023 Applicants

Students applying for financial aid complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or a state aid application. The form asks students and their parents to supply information regarding wages, income, assets, and household composition. This information is used in the federal need analysis formula called the Federal Methodology, which determines the family's expected contribution toward college costs using the student's and parents' financial resources. The formula calculates an expected Parent Contribution (PC), an expected Student Contribution (SC) and an Expected Family Contribution (EFC). These calculations determine the student's eligibility for federal student aid and, in Minnesota, the student's eligibility for the Minnesota State Grant program.




Figure 1. Minnesota Undergraduate Applicants Eligible for a Minnesota State Grant, by Income and Family Type, Fiscal Year 2023

For fiscal year 2023 (academic year 2022-2023), 110,199 students completed the FAFSA or state aid application and met eligibility requirements outlined in state statute to receive a Minnesota State Grant. These totals also included students meeting eligibility requirements under the Minnesota Dream Act. Approximately 75 percent of applicants were dependent students. The remaining 25 percent of applicants were independent students. As shown in Figure 1, dependent student and married independent student applicants are distributed more or less evenly across all family adjusted gross incomes. Independent students who are unmarried tend to be less evenly distributed across family adjusted gross incomes. Most unmarried independent students have family incomes of less than \$40,000.

Income Profile of Applicants by Dependency Status

Across all institution types, independent students had lower median family incomes (\$25,300) than dependent students (\$80,700). Independent students enrolled at the University of Minnesota system had the lowest median family income (\$18,000), while dependent students at the same system had the highest median family income (\$100,600) (Figure 3, Table 1).





Figure 2. Median Family Adjusted Gross Income, by Sector Fiscal Year 2023 State Grant Applicants

Enrollment Profile of Applicants by Income




Figure 4. Federal Pell and Minnesota State Grant Awards Received, by Family Adjusted Gross Income, Fiscal Year 2023

The State Grant program provides funds to economically disadvantaged students to attend the institution of their choosing. However, despite access to financial aid, observed enrollment patterns of Minnesota students align with a student's socioeconomic status. As family adjusted gross income increases, a greater percentage of students enroll at private non-profit institutions and the University of Minnesota (Figure 4). The University of Minnesota had the highest median family adjusted gross income (\$94,700 among all students) among Minnesota postsecondary sectors (Table 1). Among 2023 applicants from families with incomes below \$20,000, 57 percent enrolled in a Minnesota State College. By comparison, nearly two-thirds of applicants from families with incomes of \$120,000 per year or more enrolled at the University of Minnesota or a private non-profit institution (Figure 4). This comparison highlights the limitations of financial aid alone when closing equity gaps in higher education.

Figure 3. Institution Choice of State Grant Applicants by Family Adjusted Gross Income, Fiscal Year 2023





Figure 6. Average Combined Federal Pell and Minnesota State Grant Award Received, by Family Adjusted Gross Income, Fiscal Year 2023

During fiscal year 2023, 67,584 students from the initial applicant pool received a State Grant, with awards totaling approximately \$215 million. These totals included students eligible to receive the Minnesota State Grant by meeting eligibility requirements of the Minnesota Dream Act. Minnesota State Grant awards are determined solely by the student's financial need, with the highest-need students and families receiving a greater share of State Grant funding. Of the \$215 million in Minnesota State Grants awarded in fiscal year 2023, more than half of that total was awarded to students from families earning less than \$50,000 annually (Figure 5). These students represent approximately two-thirds of all State Grant recipients (Figure 6).

Figure 5. Number and Cumulative Percentage of Minnesota State Grant Recipients, Fiscal Year 2023



Many students receiving a Minnesota State Grant also receive a Federal Pell Grant award as part of their total financial aid package. Figure 6 shows the average combined award for the Federal Pell Grant and the Minnesota State Grant by income. Students from families earning less than \$10,000 annually received the highest combined average award (\$7,190) (Figure 7).

Figure 7 displays the average combined award for the Federal Pell Grant and the Minnesota State Grant by income and full-time/part-time enrollment status. Full-time enrollment is defined as being enrolled in 30 credits or more for the academic year. As shown in Figure 8, students that attend full time receive higher average State Grants and higher average Federal Pell Grants compared to students that attend part time. This is because full-time students typically pay more in total tuition per year than students attending less than full time, and the State Grant calculation considers actual tuition and fees charged to the student. Full-time students from families earning less than \$10,000 received the highest average combined award in 2023 (\$11,510) (Figure 8).

Postsecondary Institution Choice

A student's State Grant award is determined by calculating the total cost of attendance at the institution chosen by the student. Institutions are grouped into five categories for this report:

- Minnesota State Colleges two-year colleges
- Minnesota State Universities four-year universities
- University of Minnesota System
- Minnesota private non-profit institutions
- Minnesota private for-profit institutions

Tribal colleges operated by entities other than Minnesota State Colleges and Universities are included in the "Private Non-Profit Institutions" category for reporting purposes.

The State Grant award calculation uses the average tuition and fees charged to undergraduate students at their institution or the tuition and fee maximums established in state law. Students with lower average tuition and fee charges receive smaller awards. As a result, lower-cost institutions receive a smaller percentage of total State Grant funds (e.g. Minnesota State Colleges). Students with higher-than-average tuition and fee charges receive larger State Grant awards, resulting in higher-cost institutions receiving a greater percentage of total State Grant funds (e.g. University of Minnesota) (Table 2).

The maximum tuition and fees allowed for two-year programs is significantly lower (\$6,484) than the maximum tuition and fees allowed for four-year programs (\$16,106). Because full-time students will also receive a higher State Grant award, institutions that enroll a higher percentage of full-time students tend to receive a higher percentage of total State Grant funds as compared to institutions that enroll a higher percentage of part-time students.

Demographics of Recipients





Figure 9. Minnesota State Grant Recipients by Student Race and Ethnicity, BIPOC Recipients, Fiscal Year 2023




Figure 10. Minnesota State Grant Recipients by Student Legal Sex, Fiscal Year 2023

In 2023, 49 percent of State Grant recipients identified as Black, Indigenous, or persons of color (BIPOC) (Figure 9). A full disaggregation of State Grant recipients by race and ethnicity is shown in Figure 10.

Figure 8. Minnesota State Grant Recipients by Student Race and Ethnicity, Fiscal Year 2023

Roughly 61% of State Grant recipients reported as female in 2023, while roughly one-third of recipients reported as male (Figure 11).

State Grant recipients were, on average, 23.5 years old in fiscal year 2023, but the average age of State Grant recipients varies by institution type (Table 3). At Minnesota State Colleges, students over the age of 24 make up more than one-third of State Grant recipients. By comparison, at the University of Minnesota system, students in these same age brackets represent less than 10% of recipients at the system (Figure 12).





Dependency Status & Family Circumstances

The student's and family's ability to pay for the total cost of attendance (tuition and fees, plus living and miscellaneous expense allowance) is assessed differently for each family category in the State Grant award formula. Family categories are:

- Dependent students (usually students younger than 24 years old who are not married, not supporting their own children, and are not veterans/military service members)
- Married independent students with dependents of their own (usually children)
- Unmarried independent students with dependents
- Married independent students with no dependents other than a spouse
- Unmarried independent students with no dependents

The profile of students enrolling by institution type varies. The majority of grant recipients enrolling at Minnesota State Universities, the University of Minnesota and private non-profit institutions are dependent students, as shown in Figure 13.

Registration Load

The registration load or number of course credits the student enrolls in affects the price of attendance used in calculating Minnesota State Grant awards. The Minnesota State Grant program defines full-time attendance as a registration load of at least 15 credits per term or the equivalent (30 credits per academic year). Average registration load varies by income and family status for State Grant recipients. Dependent students register for more credits annually on average (25.19) than independent students (17.90-21.04), as shown in Table 5.

State Grant recipients from families with an adjusted gross income of \$100,000 or more register for more credits annually on average (27.70) than recipients with family incomes of less than \$100,000 (Table 6). This highlights the economic stratification that exists in how many credits students choose to enroll in.

Minnesota Dream Act

In May 2013, the State Legislature passed, and Governor Dayton signed into law, the Minnesota Dream Act (officially titled in Minnesota law as the Prosperity Act). Under this law, undocumented students meeting the criteria in the Minnesota Dream Act are eligible for in-state tuition rates, privately funded financial aid administered by Minnesota public colleges and universities, and can apply for state financial aid, including the Minnesota State Grant program. Minnesota students granted Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) may also be eligible.

The Minnesota Dream Act provides certain benefits to undocumented students with the following criteria:

- Attended a Minnesota high school for at least 3 years; and
- Graduated from a Minnesota high school or earned a GED in Minnesota; and
- Registered with the U.S. Selective Service (applies only to males 18 to 25 years old); and
- Provided documentation to show they have applied for lawful immigration status, but only if a federal
 process exists for a student to do so (does not include applying for Deferred Action for Childhood
 Arrivals). Currently, no federal process exists; therefore, this documentation is not currently required.


During fiscal year 2023, 382 students received state grants pursuant to the Minnesota Dream Act, as shown in Table 7. Students applying for a Minnesota State Grant by completing a state aid application under the Minnesota Dream Act are included in all reporting on Minnesota State Grant program recipients throughout this report.

Of total State Grant applicants, fewer than one percent of students complete a state aid application (the Minnesota Dream Act), as opposed to a FAFSA in any given year. Overall, the majority of Dream Act applicants are from families earning less than \$60,000 adjusted gross income. By comparison, the State Grant applicants who file the FAFSA tend to be more evenly distributed across the family income spectrum, with more than a quarter of applicants from families earning \$100,000 adjusted gross income or more (Figure 2). 





State Grants 2006-2023




Figure 16. Minnesota Ranks in the Top 20 States in Total Aid to Undergraduates, 2021-2022

For the 2021-2022 academic year, Minnesota's State Grant program was 17th in the nation for total grant aid awarded, according to the annual survey of National Association of State Student Grant & Aid Programs (Figure 16). Total grant aid includes aid awarded solely on the basis of a student's financial need (need-based aid⁴), as well as aid awarded by some other standard — such as academic merit — without considering financial need (non-need-based aid⁵). For example, all of the \$915 million awarded to students by the state of Georgia is considered non-need-based aid, while nearly all of the \$211 million awarded to students by the state of Minnesota is considered need-based aid. Minnesota ranks 16th in the nation in total grant aid spending when only need-based grant aid is considered.

⁴ Need-based grants are those awarded based solely on the student's financial need.

⁵ Non-need-based grants are those awarded on measures other than the student's financial need, such as academic merit.

Minnesota spends an average of \$1,067 per full-time equivalent (FTE) ⁶ undergraduate, which places Minnesota 17th among all other states in grant spending per FTE. The top-spending state in the nation is South Carolina (\$2,718), according to the 2021-2022 annual survey of the National Association of State Student Grant & Aid Programs (Figure 17). When considering need-based aid only, Minnesota ranks 7th in the nation, spending \$1,067 per FTE undergraduate.
