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REQUEST FOR EXPANSION OF MN RECONNECT

The Minnesota Office of Higher Education (OHE) and Minnesota State Academic and Student Affairs division invite institutions to apply to participate in the expansion of MN Reconnect, a program to support adult learners at Minnesota State Colleges.

Program Overview

The Minnesota Legislature has awarded the Minnesota Office of Higher Education funding to support adult learners' return to college to complete a college certificate or degree. MN Reconnect focuses on re-engaging adult who have some college credits but no certificate or degree to return to college using financial incentives, addressing barriers, and providing one-on-one support. This program focuses efforts on closing the attainment gap within Minnesota. Similar programs have proven successful in Tennessee¹ and Indiana². The program began as a pilot program with four institutions in 2018. This expansion proposal will allow an additional two to six institutions to participate in the program.

In 2016, Minnesota State Colleges and Universities served more than 254,000 students in credit courses³. Half of those students are students of color, American Indian students, first generation students or low-income students⁴. For students entering Minnesota State Colleges between Fall 2005 and Fall 2012 three-year completion rates varied from 33% to 57% in relationship to academic preparation and financial need of students⁴. Non-completing students are now working adults with some college credits, likely some debt, but no certificate or degree. They likely make up a majority of the 143,000 Minnesotans reported by the Office of Higher Education in this category.

MN Reconnect allows Minnesota State Colleges to provide students another opportunity to achieve their educational dreams or create new ones. This program addresses issues of inequity within postsecondary completion; improving workforce preparation and helping students achieve their academic and professional goals. The racial, ethnic, economic, age and

experiential diversity of Minnesota students brings significant assets to campus life and creates a dynamic community for learning together from one another.

The MN Reconnect program has four components:

1. Targeted outreach and re-enrollment of former Minnesota State students, including people of color, the first in their families to go to college and low-income households
2. Navigation and support in the re-enrollment process addressing individual barriers
3. Targeted financial assistance, including emergency grants and funding to alleviate debt from financial holds, and
4. Program evaluation/reporting.

Funding Available

Funding is provided by the legislature through June 30, 2021. Funding is provided by the Minnesota Office of Higher Education for the academic year with grants for students being available fall 2020.

Eligible students enrolled at participating institutions will receive:

- Financial assistance - \$1,000 MN Reconnect grants per student for each term enrolled for up to 6 terms in addition to all other grant assistance received by the student including Federal Pell Grant and Minnesota State Grants or local campus scholarships.
- Financial assistance – fund to pay off student financial holds prior to re-enrollment.

Participating institutions will receive:

- Communications products and support in promotion of MN Reconnect.
- Limited technical assistance for program participation and evaluation.
- Institutions will have access to limited funding to complete the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL) Adult 360 assessment (approximately \$8000 per campus).
- Institutions having completed the CAEL assessment may receive funding for institutional support services.

Note: Funding for 2021 does not include funds to pay for staff at this time.

Requirements and Eligibility

Institutions eligible to apply to participate in MN Reconnect include Minnesota State two-year colleges. Two-six additional institutions, representing both Greater MN and Twin Cities, will be selected to participate in MN Reconnect beginning May 2020 with student eligibility

commencing July 1, 2020. All institutions (collectively) will support an estimated 500 returning adult learners in fiscal year 2021.

Selected institutions will be expected to:

1. Coordinate with system office to identify former students aged 25-62 *who have completed 15 college credits*,⁴ and engage in efforts to do outreach to and facilitate re-enrollment of identified students,
2. Provide intensive advising for re-enrollment, degree selection and program planning, credit for prior learning (CPL), and support for completion; no additional funding will be provided for staffing,
3. Offer targeted financial assistance from the grant program and if possible offer access to or referrals for any needed community resources or alternative funding,
4. Develop recommendations to support adult students, including people of color, the first in their families to go to college, and low-income students.

Priorities

It is the policy of the State of Minnesota to ensure fairness, precision, equity and consistency in competitive grant awards. This includes implementing diversity and inclusion in grant-making. [The Policy on Rating Criteria for Competitive Grant Review](#) establishes the expectation that grant programs intentionally identify how the grant serves diverse populations, especially populations experiencing inequities and/or disparities.

The proposals for the expansion of this program will:

- extend and strengthen persistence and completion of all adult learners;
- assist in the elimination of opportunity and student success gaps;
- support the development of innovative, adult learner education programs, services or practices; and
- Meet rigorous standards for creating environments that attract, retain and cultivate talent, including people of color, the first in their families to go to college, and low-income households.

⁴ **Eligibility criteria for student selection**

- MN resident students
- Students who have not been enrolled at an institution for the two academic years prior to re-enrollment
- Students enrolling in a certificate, diploma or degree program to be completed within two academic years
- No prior credential obtained (short term <16 credit certificates are acceptable)

Grant outcomes will include:

- Identification of at least 100 students who are eligible to re-enroll in college and utilize MN Reconnect grants,
- Identification of at least 100 students from lower completion groups who are eligible to enroll in the MN Reconnect program, and
- Increase the number of students persisting and completing college.
